Bonita Unified Teachers Receive Mini-Grants from Rotary Club of La Verne

Applications are reviewed by a panel of Rotarians, who evaluate them for innovation, clarity and the potential benefit of the program to students. The mini-grants, which can be used to purchase materials, equipment and classroom supplies, are funded entirely by the Rotary Club.
