Students with special needs were welcomed to campus by cheering Kaiser students before enjoying a welcome breakfast and community health fair. Led by Kaiser's marching band, cheer team and JROTC students, the athletes paraded across campus toward the stadium.

Kaiser High's Link Crew, ASB and JROTC students competed alongside students with special needs in track and field events like the 50-meter dash, softball throw, wheelchair social, long jump and sensory obstacle course – an event for students with more involved disabilities.

Students cooled off with water challenges, including a water balloon toss and bottle-filling relay.
