Lynwood Unified Celebrates Graduates

87 percent of the Lynwood and Firebaugh graduates will attend college, universities or will enter the U.S. Armed Forces

Lynwood, Calif. – Lynwood Unified celebrated nearly 900 graduates from Firebaugh, Lynwood and Vista high schools during commencement ceremonies which took place from June 1 through June 5, representing the beginning of a new chapter in students' journeys into careers and higher education.

"We take such pride in the fact that so many of our students are advancing to the next level of education and fulfilling the goals they set forth when they entered our high schools," said LUSD Superintendent Paul Gothold. "These ceremonies serve as celebration not only for our graduates but for all those that worked to support them and their aspirations. We hope that they will continue to gain wisdom and return to be the business and civic leaders of our communities in the future."

Since 2011, the number of graduating seniors at Firebaugh High has skyrocketed nearly 20 percent, with 89.2 percent of seniors graduating in 2014-15. Similarly, Lynwood High has also seen a significant increase, with 80.9 percent of seniors graduating in 2014-15.

Lynwood Unified's two comprehensive high schools are sending more students than ever to institutes of higher education. More than 87 percent of the graduating classes at Firebaugh and Lynwood highs will advance to a university, college or enter the U.S. Armed Forces.

Lynwood High School

On June 1, Lynwood High held its graduation at University of Southern California's Galen Center, where nearly 400 students culminated their high school experience surrounded by the red brick USC's state-of-the-art sports arena.

Parents, friends, faculty and staff watched student speakers on the center-court scoreboards. Even Principal Carlos Zaragoza surprised the graduates and crowd in his speech when he took out his cell phone mounted on a "selfie-stick" and took a photo of himself in front of the class of 2015 on the stage.

Lynwood High's valedictorian was Rebeca Canche, whose 4.63 GPA landed her a spot on UCLA's fall roster, and the salutatorian was Luis Lara-Espinoza, who graduated with a 4.63 GPA and will attend St. Martin's University in Washington.

Firebaugh High School

On June 4, Firebaugh High School celebrated its more than 350 graduates during commencement ceremonies at Whittier College. They heard inspirational stories from Valedictorian Jesus Garcia, who is headed to Cornell University in New York, and Salutatorian Leonardo Vega, who will attend UCLA this fall.
